#### THE GATHERING OF THE COMMUNITY

Welcome to this Service of Remembrance and Hope, a time when we can, with others, acknowledge the feelings we have at Christmas time, the reasons for them, and offer them to God. In two days, we will experience the shortest day and the longest night of the year. Certain memorable phrases come to mind at this time: "long dark night of the soul", "the winter of our discontent," in which memories of past experiences and the pain of present experiences can become overwhelming. For some, Christmas Day is the most difficult; for others, Christmas Eve, or New Year's Eve, or the beginning of another lonely New Year. In this service, we'll share in some singing appropriate to the Christmas season, recognizing that this is not a season of joy for everyone. We will invite you to reflect on the pain, the loneliness, and the sadness you may feel and offer it all to our great sign of hope, the Christ Child. We pray that you will find hope and comfort in knowing that you are not alone.

#### THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

THE HOLY GOSPEL: John 1: 1-18

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him and cried out, 'This was he of whom I said, "He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me." ') From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

#### LITANY OF REMEMBRANCE WITH CANDLE LIGHTING

We gather the pain of the past into our open hands, and offer it to you, O God, asking that you take it, and then, into our empty, open hands, place the gift of peace.

We light this second candle to remember those persons whom we have loved and see no longer. We pause to remember individual names, faces, voices. I invite your own prayers, silently or aloud. (*Pause*)

We give thanks for the memory that binds them to us in this season in which we anticipate Christmas.

All May God's eternal love surround them.

We light this third candle to remember ourselves this Christmas time. We pause and remember the past weeks, months and for some of us, years of sad times. (Silent Prayer)

We remember the poignancy of memories, the grief, the sadness, the hurts, the pain of reflecting on our own mortality.

All Let us remember that dawn defeats darkness.

HYMN Silent night, holy night,

shepherds quake at the sight, glories stream from heaven afar, heavenly hosts sing alleluia, Christ, the Savior, is born! Christ, the Savior, is born!

This fourth candle is lit to remember the gift of faith and hope that God offers us in the Christmas story. We remember that in Jesus, God shares our life completely, and promises us a place and time where there is no pain or grief, forever.

All Let us remember the One who shows the way, the One who goes with us into our tomorrow, the One who walks with us always.

HYMN Silent night, holy night,

Son of God, love's pure light radiant beams from thy holy face, with the dawn of redeeming grace,

In the spirit of this season, let us now ask God for what we need for ourselves as people coping with loss, pain, suffering, loneliness, grief, or sadness during this season. *Pause for reflection and prayer, either silently or aloud*

God, we come to you as Christmas nears with the pain growing inside us. As the nights have been growing longer, so has the darkness wrapped itself around our hearts. In this season of our longest nights, we offer to you the pain in our hearts, the traumas that some of us cannot put into words.

*Celebrant* The Christmas season reminds us of all that used to be and cannot be anymore.

The memories of what was, the fears of what may be, stifle us. All around us we

hear sounds of celebration that are often hard for us to share. Emmanuel,

All be with us this night and through this season.

#### PROCESSION TO THE ALTAR

People are invited to move to the illuminated Christmas tree, take a votive candle, symbolizing remembrance and hope, and place it on the stand in front of the altar. Those doing so are also invited to offer a petition either silently or aloud.




#### Celebrant


